# CONVERSATION 2.14.18

Already, Still, Yet & Anymore

## Already

- We use *already* to explain something that happened in the past. Answers with already are positive.

## Still

- We use *still* to talk about something that began in the past and continues into the present. Answers with still can be positive or negative.

## Yet

- We use *yet* to show that something is expected to happen, but hasn't. Answers with yet are usually negative.

## Anymore

- We use *anymore* to talk about something that began in the past but does not continue into the present. Answers with anymore are negative.

## SHOPPING

Did you <b>already</b> find a blouse?	+	Yes. I have <b>already</b> found a blouse.
Are you <b>still</b> looking for boots?	+/-	Yes. I'm <b>still</b> looking. I <b>still</b> haven't found a nice pair.

Are you done shopping <b>yet</b> ?	-	No, not <b>yet</b> .
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Do you shop there <b>anymore</b> ?	-	No, not <b>anymore</b> .
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### OTHER EXAMPLES

Q: Is it **still** raining? / Is it raining **still**?

A: Yes, it's **still** raining./ No it's not raining **anymore**.

Q: Have you found an apartment **yet**?

A: No, not **yet**.

Q: Did you eat dinner **already**? / Did you **already** eat dinner?

A: Yeah, I ate **already**.

Q: Have you bought your wife flowers for Valentine's Day **yet**?

A: I haven't **yet**!

Q: Do you go to Pasadena **anymore**?




A: I don't go there **anymore**.

Q: Are you **still** running everyday?

A: Yes, I'm **still** running everyday.

### stand out

- *verb*: to be easily noticeable
